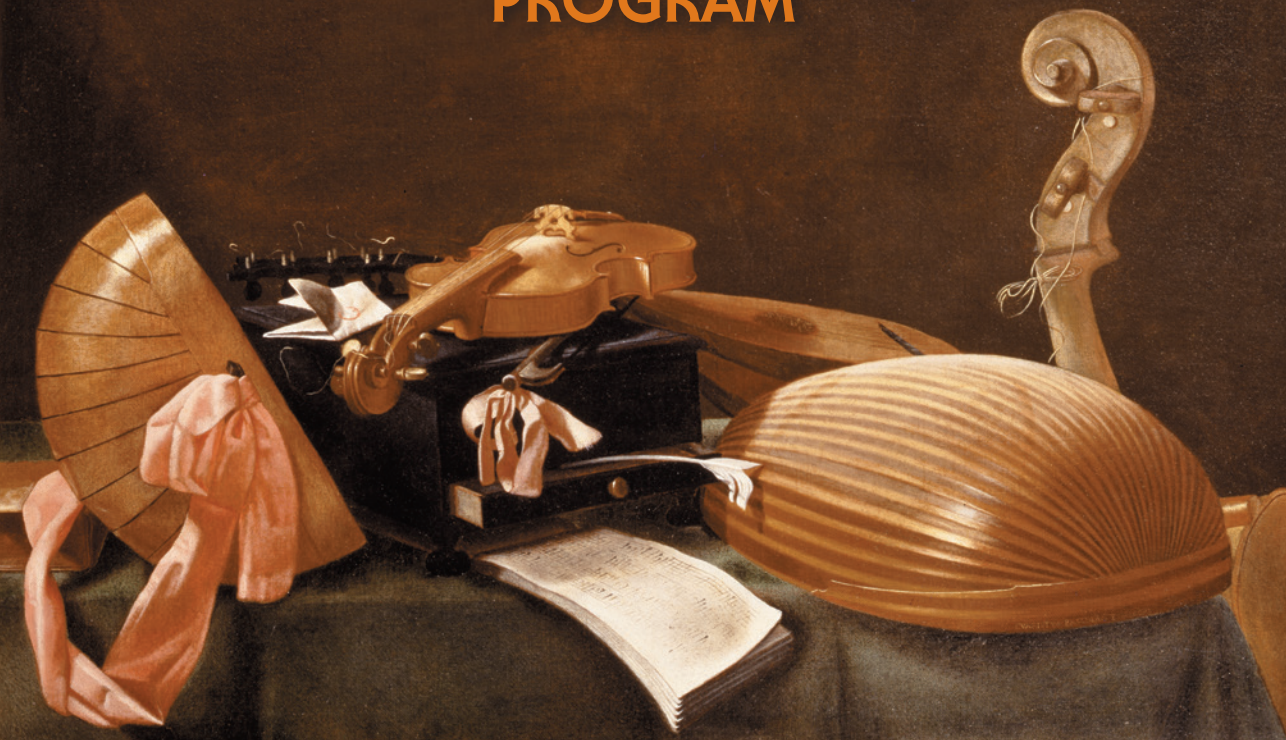

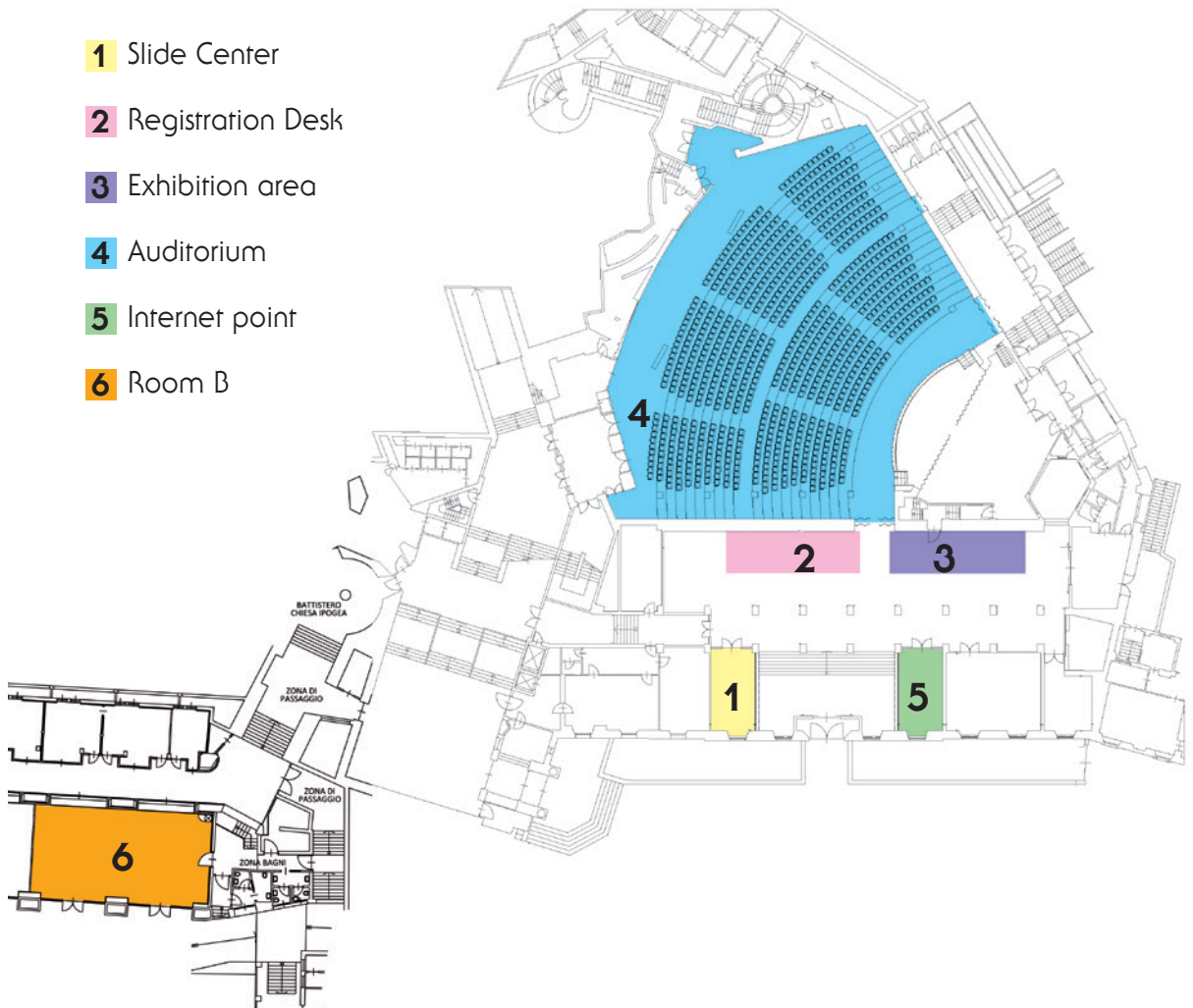

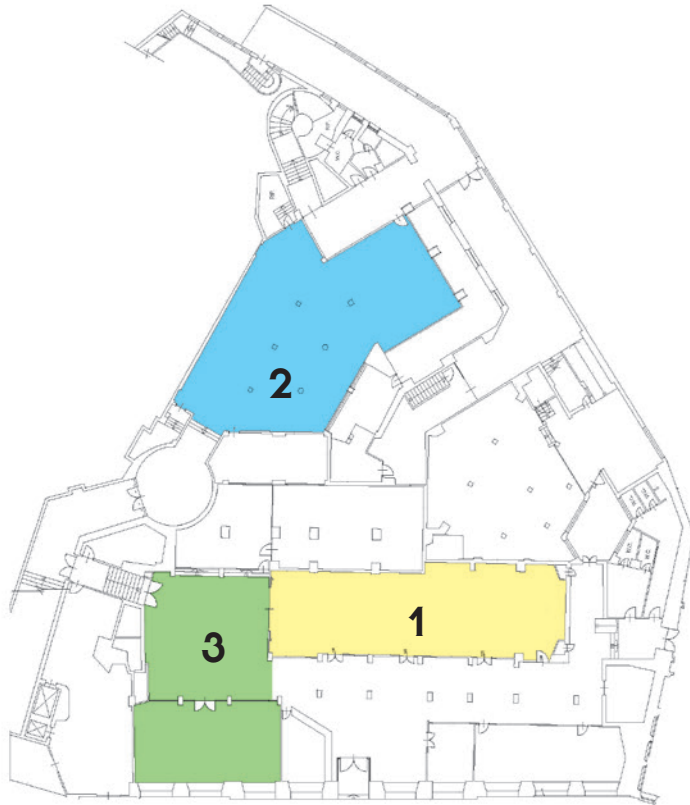

If you happen to see a lotus flower, papyrus and a carnivorous *drosera carnivora* in the company of a Madagascar palm, the *sanguisorba orobica*, sugar cane and candelabra cactus you are probably at the Botanical Gardens of Bergamo.

foot: traffic, noise and anxiety must be left at the bottom of the Colle Aperto staircase, near the seventeenth century Powder Magazine. A beautiful panorama repays your efforts on arrival, the view sweeps across the rooftops and the monuments of the Città Alta to the foothills of the Prealps of Bergamo. The Botanical Gardens of Bergamo, with their demonstrative and suggestive character, help to bring the public closer to the world of plants and foster respect for nature. They carry out conservation activities for endangered plants and have undertaken projects for their reintroduction to their natural habitat. One of the latest successful ventures was the re-introduction of *Osmunda regalis*, a fern noted in 1853 by the botanist and doctor Lorenzo Rota, the first chronicler of the flora of Bergamo, who saw it in Val Calepio and on the banks of the River Adda. This fern, which had disappeared in the wild state for a few decades, was reintroduced about a dozen years ago. The Gardens exchange seeds, fruit and spores collected in the Gardens themselves or in the wild.



They are not the plant equivalent of the Tower of Babel, but rather a small feud of the Plant Kingdom which collects representatives of flora from the principle categories into which botanists subdivide the over 250,000 species on our planet.

Rich in plant life but not very big, the Botanical Gardens of Bergamo, which the magazine 'Gardenia' define as 'that hidden jewel', is set in the ring of the Mura Venete (Venetian Walls). The Gardens can be reached only on





CITY OF BERGAMO

The city of Bergamo is located in Northern Italy, 50 kilometers from Milan, in the borderland between the great plain of the Po Valley and the Alps.

Bergamo was founded on a hill by an ancient settlement in the prehistorical age, which gave it the configuration that still characterizes the oldest part of the town, enclosed within walls up on the hill, while the modern town has grown on the plain. Celts, Goths, Romans, Longbards resided on the hill, but little can now be seen of them; some of the most important monuments date back to the Middle Ages. The town reached its greatest splendor during the Renaissance when it became part of the Milan Signoria and then of the Venetian Republic. The four centuries under the Venetians were the most significant with respect to their cultural and historical impact on the city.



Città Alta (Upper Town), the old town situated on the hill and surrounded by sixteenth-century walls, has maintained the charm of its past over the centuries, with the magic and quiet atmosphere of its belfries, towers and squares. Città Bassa (Downtown), the modern town, has all the conveniences of a modern urban center. Thus, Bergamo is the town where old and new come together in a harmonious expression of life.
